Dinara: Hi, Parvina! You have already graduated from KIMEP! My Congratulations to you! You must be feeling amazing about this fact and have a lot to share with us. That is why I have several questions for you. If you were a freshman again, what advice would you give yourself?

Parvina: To decrease my participation in student organizations and extracurricular activities and devote more time to my studies.
